THE FIRST READING

2 SAMUEL 11:1-15

In the spring of the year, the time when kings go out to battle, David sent Joab with his officers and all Israel with him; they ravaged the Ammonites, and besieged Rabbah. But David remained at Jerusalem.

It happened, late one afternoon, when David rose from his couch and was walking about on the roof of the king's house, that he saw from the roof a woman bathing; the woman was very beautiful. David sent someone to inquire about the woman. It was reported, "This is Bathsheba daughter of Eliam, the wife of Uriah the Hittite." So David sent messengers to get her, and she came to him, and he lay with her. (Now she was purifying herself after her period.) Then she returned to her house. The woman conceived; and she sent and told David, "I am pregnant."

So David sent word to Joab, "Send me Uriah the Hittite." And Joab sent Uriah to David. When Uriah came to him, David asked how Joab and the people fared, and how the war was going. Then David said to Uriah, "Go down to your house, and wash your feet." Uriah went out of the king's house, and there followed him a present from the king. But Uriah slept at the entrance of the king's house with all the servants of his lord, and did not go down to his house. When they told David, "Uriah did not go down to his house," David said to Uriah, "You have just come from a journey. Why did you not go down to your house?" Uriah said to David, "The ark and Israel and Judah remain in booths; and my lord Joab and the servants of my lord are camping in the open field; shall I then go to my house, to eat and to drink, and to lie with my wife? As you live, and as your soul lives, I will not do such a thing." Then David said to Uriah, "Remain here today also, and tomorrow I will send you back." So Uriah remained in Jerusalem that day. On the next day, David invited him to eat and drink in his presence and made him drunk; and in the evening he went out to lie on his couch with the servants of his lord, but he did not go down to his house. In the morning David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent it by the hand of Uriah. In the letter he wrote, "Set Uriah in the forefront of the hardest fighting, and then draw back from him, so that he may be struck down and die."

THE GOSPEL

John 6:1-21

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Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Tesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

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When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

POSTLUDE ALLEGRO MODERATO E SERIOSO FROM SONATA NO. 1 IN F MINOR, OP. 65 Felix Mendelssohm

Notes on the Notes: Both of today's voluntaries come from Mendelssohn's set of six organ sonatas, Op. 65. These sonatas have their genesis in a commission for a set of organ "voluntaries." Mendelssohn drafted a number of these pieces, but eventually decided to rework them into six groups of works which he called "sonatas," even though the pieces are not strictly speaking in sonata form. Mendelssohn likely thought that labeling them with this more familiar term would improve their sales, particularly on the continent.

Today's voluntaries also both include Lutheran hymn tunes. The prelude is a set of variations on the chorale "Vater unser im Himmelreich," a German translation of the Lord's Prayer. The postlude consists of an introduction and fugue, but, unusually, the fugue is interrupted several times by quiet statements of the chorale "Was mein Gott will, das g'scheh allzeit" (What my God wants should always happen). After several of these interruptions, Mendelssohn resumes the fugue, but this time using the inverted form of the original fugue subject. All this intellectual virtuosity eventually breaks down to make way for technical virtuosity, manifested in a flashy pedal part.

Little Free Pantry

New Home, New Ways to Support

The Little Free Pantry (LFP) has moved to the Broadway Community Garden (1605 Broadway). If you would like to put food in the box you can pull into the driveway on Broadway, or park in the lot in the alley between Broadway and Spring Streets. There are stairs leading up to the garden.

If you can't put food directly in the box, you may drop off food in the parish office or Morrison Hall and staff will make sure it gets to the box.

The LFP is stocked organically. Those who wish to contribute may do so at their discretion when convenient. Demand outpaces supply, so the LFP is often empty. However, empty shelves are problematic only if no one is contributing. Food should be non-perishable, like canned vegetables and proteins, or dried goods.

RibFest

RibFest is a community event and rib-cooking competition with proceeds benefiting the ministries of St. Margaret's Episcopal Church. RibFest will be held Saturday, September 21st, 2024 from 4:00-7:00 p.m. on the grounds of St. Margaret's 20900 Chenal Parkway in Little Rock.

RibFest plans include:

- 6-12 Cooking Teams, each with a booth or tent for serving their ribs
- Open judging: all persons with a ticket will have the opportunity to sample ribs and vote for their favorites
- A trophy and "bragging rights" for the top cooking team
- Live music
- Local craft vendors
- Advance admission \$30 for adults, \$15 for children ages 6-12.
