BIDDING PRAYER

Notes on the Notes:

David Willcocks was music director of the chapel at King's College, Cambridge, the church which popularized this exact service of nine lessons and carols. He is best known for his wonderful arrangements of Christmas carols, including tonight's final verses of "Once in royal David's city," "O come, all ye faithful," and "Hark! the herald angels sing."

Christmas Lessons and Carols traditionally begins with the hymn "Once in royal David's city," sung to the tune Irby. The custom is for a child to sing verse 1 as a solo, the choir to sing verse 2, and the congregation and organ to join in for verses three through six.

This evening's choral music includes an eclectic mix of composers and sources: a late Renaissance/early Baroque Dutch motet, an arrangement of the quintessential Christmas African-American spiritual, and four carols by 20th-century English composers.
