Notes on the Notes

The Saint-Saëns Prelude and Fugue in B major is one of the few organ pieces which bring to mind words like "cute" and "adorable," but cute and adorable it is. The Prelude is highly melodic and lyrical, and the Fugue is a charming scherzo in three voices. (While very common on the piano, three-voice fugues are exceptionally rare on the organ, due to the availability of more limbs.) When compared to the grandiosity of other preludes and fugues by Bach, Mendelssohn, Brahms, and Reger, Saint-Saëns seems to be deliberately taking this ubiquitous genre in a new, more modest direction.
