THE EPISTLE

I CORINTHIANS 15:35-38, 42-50

Comeone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they Come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.

So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED

If you would like to know about the Cathedral building and its history, a docent-led tour is available following the service. The tour starts in the baptistery at the back of the church.

Notes on the Notes: This morning's music includes two selections connected to Charles Hubert Hastings Parry. The first is the psalm chant, which Sarah MacDonald derived from the opening choral statement of Parry's beloved *I was glad*. The second is the offertory anthem, *My soul, there is a country*. This is the first of Parry's six *Songs of Farewell*, one of the masterpieces of twentieth-century choral music. Parry wrote these pieces during World War I; sadly, he died one month before the armistice was signed.

We are very fortunate and grateful to have Dr. Maxine Thévenot as this weekend's guest conductor. Dr. Thévenot is an organist, conductor, choir clinician, and composer based in Albuquerque, NM, where she serves as Director of Music at St. John's Episcopal Cathedral. She is also on faculty at University of New Mexico and is the Founding and Artistic Director of *Polyphony: Voices of New Mexico*, the state's first professional resident vocal ensemble. Join us at evensong today as Dr. Thévenot leads the Trinity Choir in more wonderful sacred music.

Are you interested in deepening your life of faith? Or in revisiting the basics of the Christian life? The "Catechumenate" (an ancient Greek word for "instruction") is an annual, several-weeklong process by which adults who desire a deeper life in Christ prepare for Holy Baptism (full initiation into the Church), Confirmation (for those who are baptized), Reaffirmation (for those who are baptized and confirmed but desire to reaffirm their faith), or Reception (for those who were baptized in another denomination but desire to be received into the Episcopal Church). This group gathers weekly through Lent and Easter to share a meal, to pray, and to study the Christian faith. The Catechumenate begins on Sunday, March 9 and the Cathedral will celebrate Holy Baptism, Confirmation, Reaffirmation, and Reception on Sunday, June 1.
